

7:25 - 7:45	During the last 3 months: 112 burglaries including vehicles. (Some thieves use "snifers" to detect bluetooth and wifi so don't leave any electronics in vehicles.) 22 robberies 77 aggravated assaults 0 homicides 73 injuries including car accidents. (Use caution around busy corridors like Camden, Almaden and Hillsdale, for example.) 585 proactive stops/checks of cars, pedestrians, cyclists. Captain Donohue urges citizens to report crimes to police so they can track trends and establish patterns to better serve our community. Dial 911 to report emergencies and dial 311 for non-emergencies. Captain Donohue can be reached at 3699@sanjoseca.gov. Crime Prevention Specialists are non-sworn staff that are trained to assist with crime prevention education, neighborhood watch programs, drug and gang awareness. An inquiry was made as to the effectiveness of preventing side shows. Enforcement of side shows has been very effective with a significant decrease in these illegal events. Concern was voiced over park parties escalating into drinking, loud music and even assaults at Doerr Park. 7:45- 8:00	<ul> <li>D9 Planning Commissioner</li> <li>Noted trends include development, land use and housing.</li> <li>San Jose (and California in general) are experiencing a housing crisis with increasing rents and home prices in San Jose. San Jose is 48th in housing units per capita. San Jose needs more rental units. One way to address the housing shortage is to build more housing including high density (5-8 story housing units) and housing units over retail businesses. This will change San Jose.</li> <li>The state of California can preempt local opposition to new affordable housing. We need more resident and neighborhood involvement. We have meetings on the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of each month at 6:30pm. Cole Cameron (Cambrian Park NA) reports need to revitalize Cambrian Park Neighborhood Association. Brad Loos is glad to help with this and sees an increased need to keep residents appraised during the upcoming development of Cambrian Plaza.
